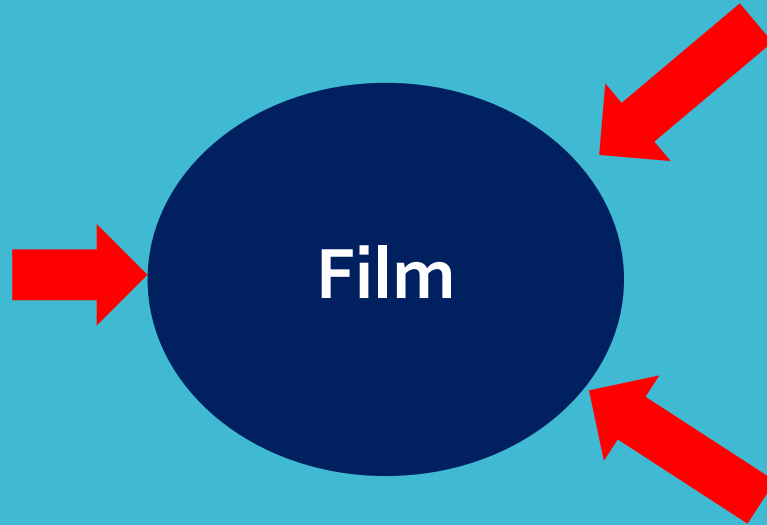

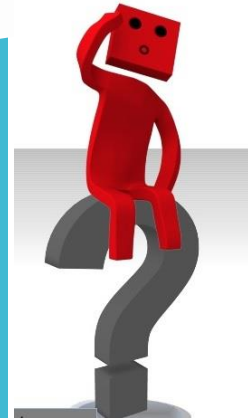

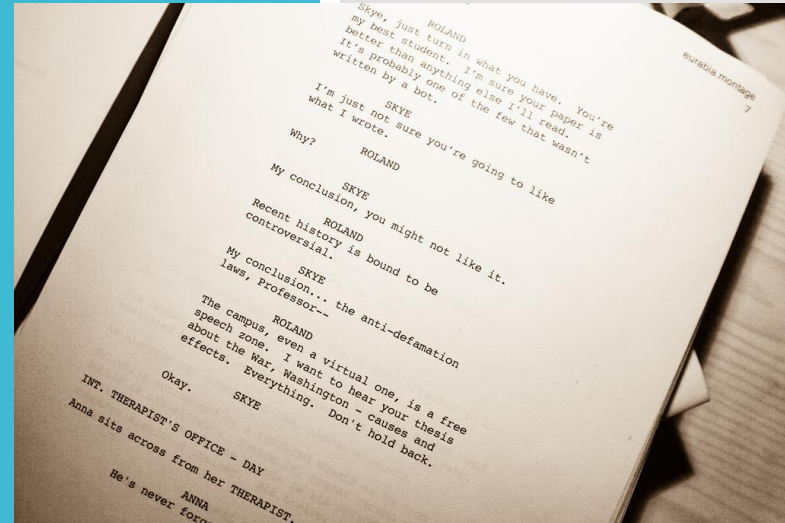

Step 2 The Script

The script is where you will put down the story, setting, and dialogue in linear form.

The importance of the script



It helps the rest of the film making team know what is going to happen in the film

- leading the actors who play the film to improvise, rehearse and play on the set
- helping the cinematic design team to design the cinematic effects

Screenwriting

Screenwriting can be called scriptwriting. It is the art and craft of writing scripts for mass media such as feature films, television productions or video games.

A Script

A script is a document that outlines every aural, visual, behavioral, and lingual element required to tell a story.

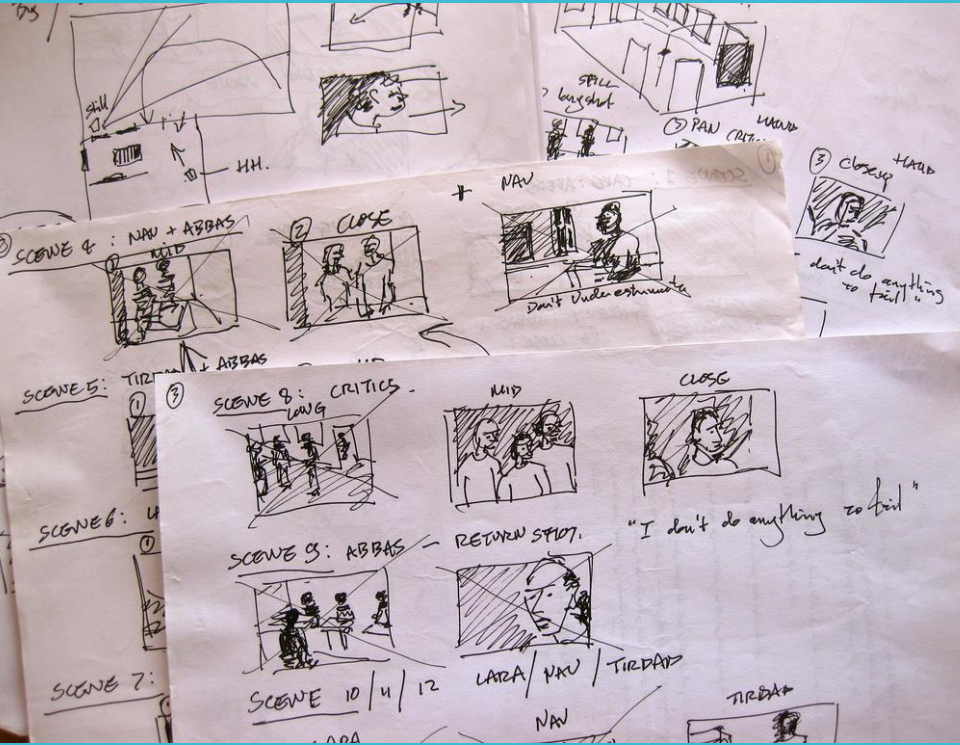
Film script is very essential “outline” because the film is a highly collaborative medium and the director, cast, editor, and production crew will, based on the “outline”, and interpret the story their way when it is filmed.

Film is a visual medium. Film makers do not TELL the audience the story but SHOW the story. So, screenwriters must learn to write a screenplay VISUALLY. Screenwriters must write that can make involved people SEE and HEAR.

Screenwriters might love their characters and know what they are thinking. The discipline of screenplay writing is how to show it on a screen. When it happens, it may be just done with a look, often improvised on the movie set. So screenplay writers (or screenwriters) write the pictures, sounds, and speeches, and so that filmmakers can do the rest.

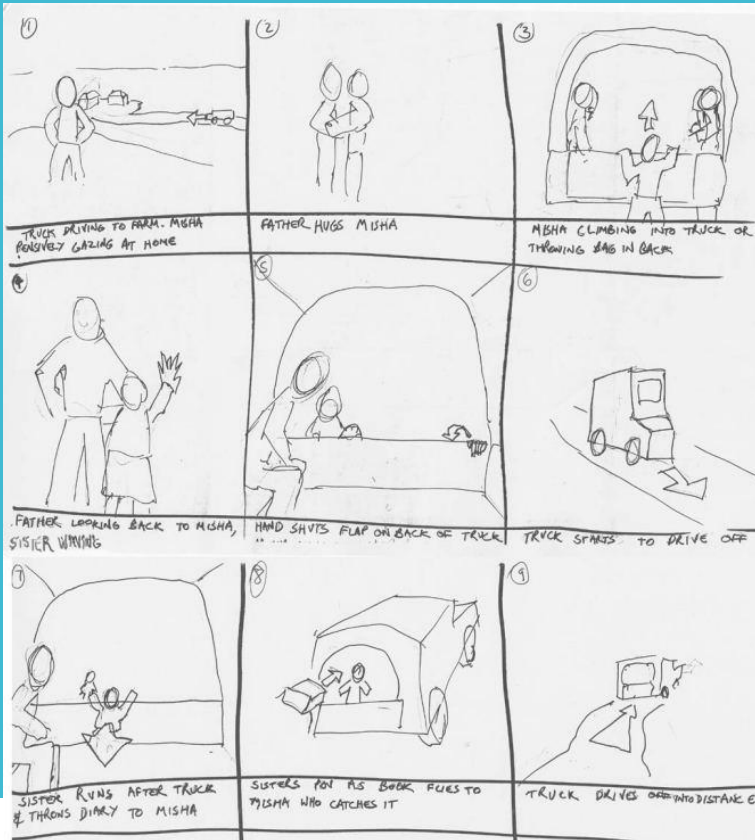
Step 3 The Storyboards



What is story board?

Film Planning

A sequence of drawings that represent the shots you plan to film.



- ✓ Storyboards represent sequence of shots that you plan to have in the film
- ✓ Storyboards help you visualize each scene
- ✓ Storyboards help you decide on camera angles, shot size, etc. Storyboards help you communicate with actors on the set

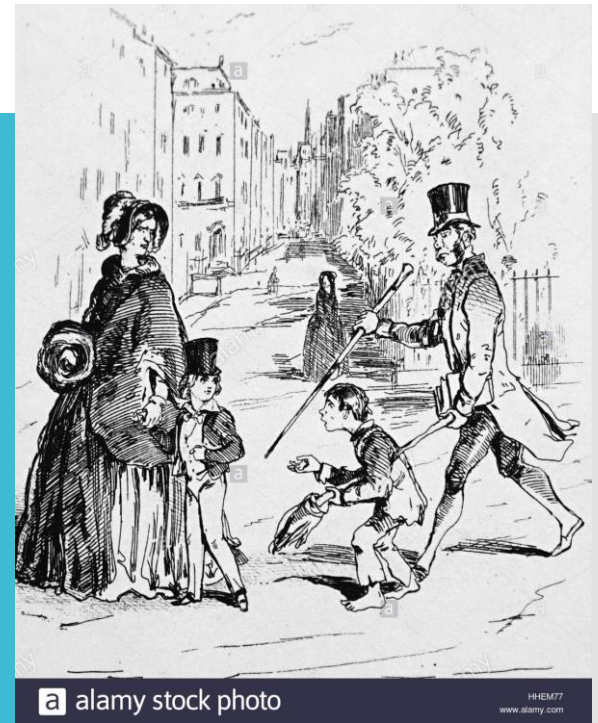

Round and Flat Characters

Round character

A round character in film (or novel, play or story) is a complex personality or has many layers of personality. They have depth in feelings and passions like real people.



It is the character who the audiences can sympathize, associate with, or relate to, because they might see this character in real life.

Characteristics of a round character

- Round characters are major characters in a story, who encounter contradictory situations, and undergo transformation during this phase. So, these characters do not remain the same throughout the story, so it is difficult to identify their traits from beginning until the end.
- These characters are more realistic, their personalities somewhat inconsistent.
- They are fully developed and show complex traits, like real people.
- Round characters are also known as “main characters,” or “major characters,” because they are suitable to surprise the readers in a very convincing manner.
- Major characters must be round characters to be believable.

Flat character

- A flat character is a type of character that does not change too much from the start of the story to its end. Flat characters are often said not to have any emotional depth or has little complexity to his/her personality.
- It is a simple character and does not undergo significant growth or changes.
- The audience does not know much about these characters, because the writer does not provide detailed information about them.



Characteristics of a flat character

- The role of flat characters is to support the main character.
- They do not go through a substantial growth or transformation in the course of the narrative/story.
- They have recognizable characteristics that make them appear stereotypical (or predictable)
- They are often referred to as one- or two-dimensional characters, usually having one perspective or point of view about life, things, or events.

Step 6 The Filming

The schedule must be organized for what will be filmed and when.

Shoot different scenes with many shots, and so you can choose for changes and editing later, and this helps in case of any problems that may occur.

Consider new angles for the same scenes (if time allows), and you will have more footage to work with.



Step 7 The Post-Production

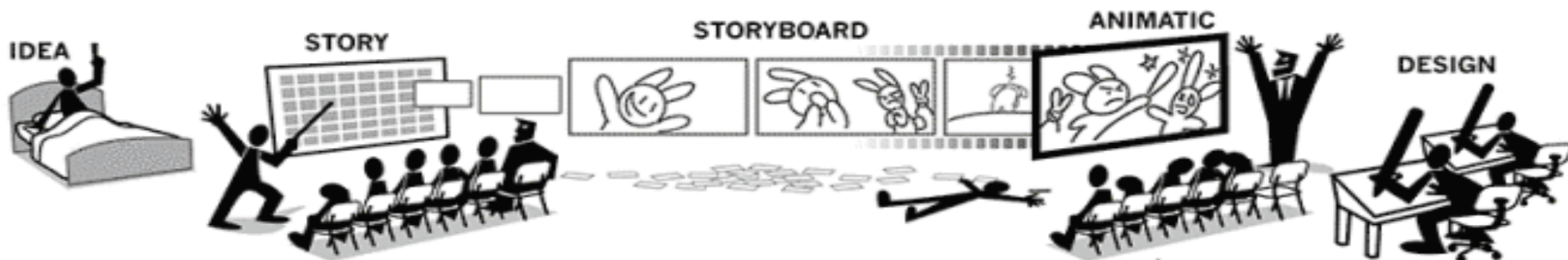
Post- production is the stage where you edit all your footage to create a rough cut of the film.

Add effects to the cuts such as sound effects, music, visual effects, color correction, the process which requires editing software

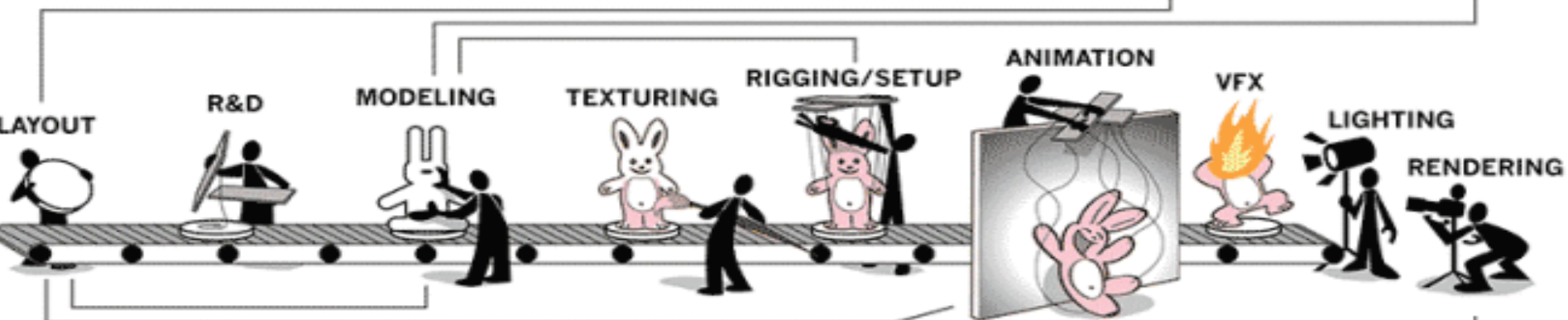
Polish the cuts and let people watch for comments and revision to get the final version.



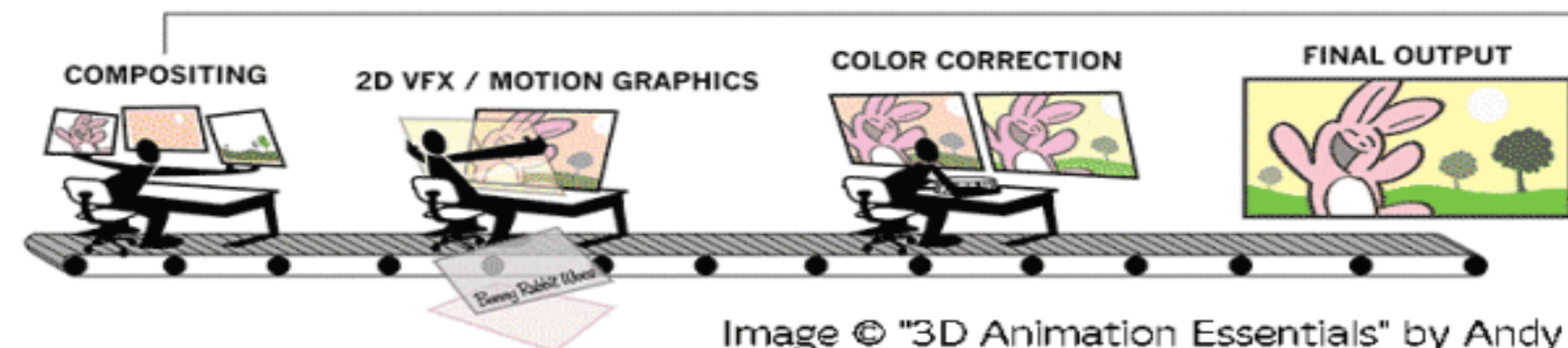

Dystopia vs. Utopia

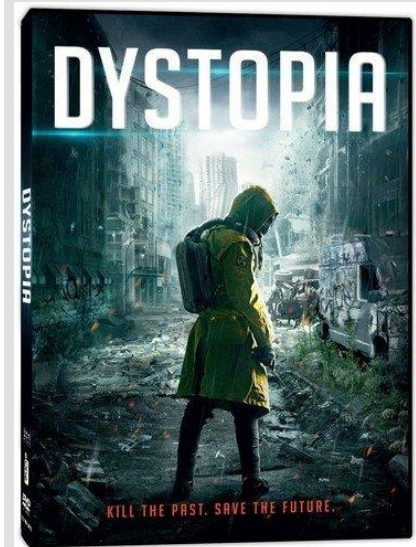
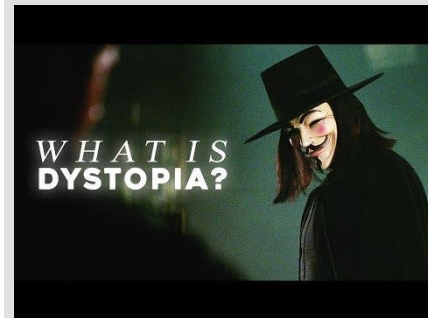
Dystopia:

Dystopia is a genre in literature that depicts a frightening society or community.

Reasons for the frightening society involve the following problems:

- (1) A corrupt / governmental totality
- (2) Dehumanization due to technological advances
- (3) Environmental disasters
- (4) Eradication of the family, cultish religions, or marginal people
- (5) Limited resources
- (6) Violence.

- Dystopias causes human misery
- In some cases people do not realize they are miserable due to propaganda that make us feel “this is an OK life!” or that make us feel this is a “Utopia” or this is a perfect place to live, a life situation that is alright. This feeling can ironically lead to such horrifying conditions or effects later.



Utopia:

A utopia is an imagined community or society that possesses highly desirable or nearly perfect qualities for its citizens

A utopia **focuses on equality** in these categories:

- (1) Economic
- (2) Government
- (3) Justice
- (4) Ecological utopian society: new ways in which society should relate to nature

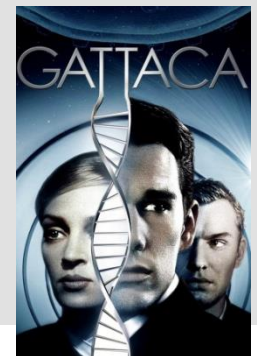
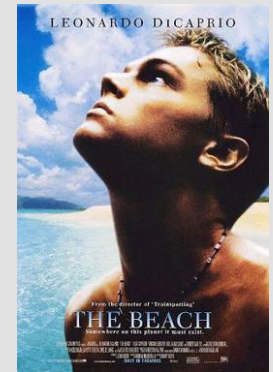

Existentialism

- Existentialism points out that the most important consideration for individuals (a human being) is that they are individuals—independently acting and responsible, conscious beings (“existence”)—rather than what labels, roles, stereotypes, definitions, or other preconceived categories the individuals fit.
- “True essence” of an individual life is significant in stead of being defined by others. Human beings create their own values through their own consciousness, and determine a meaning to their life.

Absurdity

Absurdism refers to the contradictory nature of human existence. This arises from the conflict between the human desire to find meaning in life, and the inability for humans to do so.

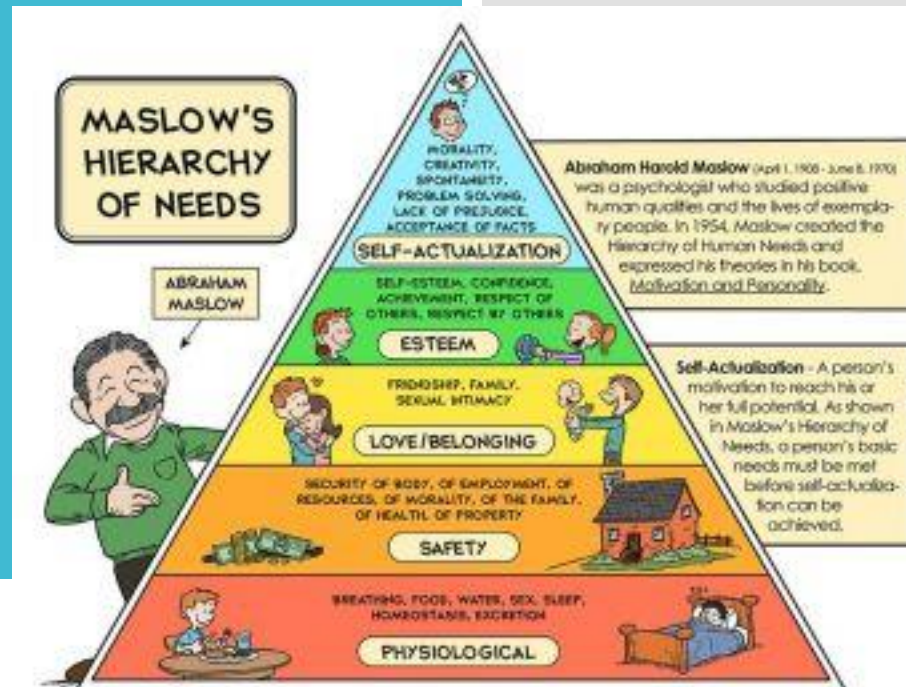
Absurdism is commonly used in a novel, play, or poem, and also in film. Absurdist film focuses on the experiences of characters in situations where they cannot find any inherent purpose in life, most often represented by ultimately meaningless actions and events that call into question the certainty of existential concepts such as truth or value.

Common elements in absurdist film (as well in fiction) include satire, dark humor, incongruity, and the abasement of reason (humiliation or degradation)

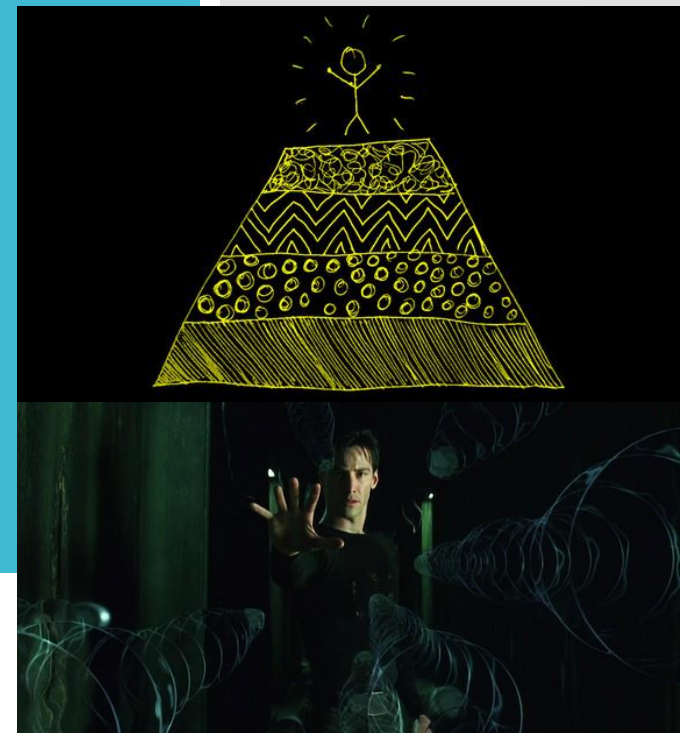


Self- Actualization/ Soul- Searching/ Discovering Oneself
